Erie County Technical Opens September 4

Administrators and Faculty

INSPECTION

Technical School Approved

All departments of the new Erie County Technical School passed inspection Monday, according to Carl S. Bauer, director of the Summit Twp. facility.

Bauer said the three-hour tour included representatives of the Department of Public Instruction, University of Pittsburgh, Indiana University and various trade areas.

The school will open Sept. 4 and will serve about 860 students. Dedication ceremonies have been tentatively scheduled for Oct. 13.

Tuesday also marked the opening of a two-week seminar for faculty members. University of Pittsburgh and Edinboro State College personnel are conducting the 10-day program.

Part of the seminar is devoted to teaching techniques and discipline and part is devoted to familiarization with the school's equipment and material.

The school has 20 faculty members and three administrative officers in addition to Dr. Kenneth Frantz, county superintendent of schools, who is the chief administrative officer.

Superintendent County Schools Addresses First Session



Dr. Kenneth Franz was the first "instructor" for the new faculty of our County Technical school. He briefed most fully the organization of the Technical school, pointing out the chain of command and the responsibility this faculty has to the students, their parents (the taxpayers) and to the school organization which employs them. He outlined the tenure law, the rights of the teacher, their need for certification to continue their employment, and how this continuance is accomplished. He strongly emphasized the need for discipline and that in Erie County during his (Dr. Franz) administration no teacher was discharged except for inability to keep discipline.

New Code of Dress and Conduct to Become Effective at Ft. LeBoeuf

Students and teachers of the Fort LeBoeuf School District have a new Code of Dress and Conduct for the coming school year. Its purpose is to improve the intellectual, moral, and social image of the schools and to act as a guide for individuals who are inclined to overlook the merits of decency and respect as well as the moral obligation of their schools to foster high standards of social behavior.

The recommendations contained in "The Code" resulted from a careful study of local needs by a twenty-two member student-faculty committee formed to improve existing conditions:

Males

1. Must wear shoes and socks.
2. Must wear full length trousers, discreet in cut and fit.
3. Long and uneven-tailed shirts are to be worn tucked into trousers.
4. All wearing apparel must be neat, clean and without objectionable lettering or marking of any kind.
5. Pendant ornaments are forbidden if they violate acceptable standards of dress.
6. Hair must not be displayed below the eyebrows, over the ears, or in long strands to the top of shirt or sweater collars.
7. Beards of any variety are forbidden. Sideburns are not to extend below the bottom of the ear.
8. A clean, well-groomed, hygienic appearance is to be maintained at all times.

Females

1. The wearing of slacks during school hours is forbidden unless authorized by the Building Principal.
 2. Clothing deemed "too tight" will be prohibited.
 3. Long, uneven tailed blouses must be worn tucked into skirts.
 4. No objectionable lettering or marking may be displayed on any piece of wearing apparel.
 5. Outer clothing must cover under garments and be worn with decorum.
 6. A clean, hygienic appearance will be mandatory at all times.
 7. Make-up must not be displayed in such manner as to violate acceptable school standards.
 8. Pendant ornaments are forbidden if they violate acceptable standards of dress.
- The recommendations presented have received approval for publication.
